# Comportamento Político: 388629 Cronograma revisado

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## Descrição

Esta disciplina tem por objetivo oferecer aos alunos da pós-graduação uma formação básica na área de comportamento político, incluindo temas como a opinião pública, a psicologia política, o voto, a comunicação política e a participação política, entre alguns. O foco da disciplina está no estudo dos comportamentos e atitudes das massas, por oposição ao estudo das elites políticas. Vale ressaltar que a grande maioria das teorias usadas no estudo do comportamento político têm por origem teorias da psicologia social e cognitiva. Estas teorias nos informam sobre como as pessoas processam e fazem uso da informação política para formar suas atitudes políticas e decidir de seus comportamentos como votar. Veremos em seguido como fatores intra-indivíduos (e.g., estereótipos, traços, emoções e personalidades) e fatores extra-indivíduo (e.g., partidos políticos, comunicações e campanhas políticas) condicionam as atitudes e comportamentos políticos das pessoas.
